Letter from Titian J. Coffey to Thomas White, September 17, 1862

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Attorney General's Office,

Washington, 17 Sept. 1862

Dear Judge

I have read and filed
the application of Mrs. Donahy
- also that of Daymond, for bounty
& back pay - They will not however
be acted on for some time as
Mr. French tells me there are about
25000 of them filed -

I sent Kinke's deposition to
the Paddy Hookville, where I
presume you got it. I had des-
patched it by express accept of
your Baltimore letter but before
I got your telegram - You were
then again that you had sent
a check for Kinke's money.
I have not rec'd it and I
presume will not now get
it, so that you had better start

It over again. That, and the letter
containing the check for Mary's
money never came to hand, and
as, so far as I know, they are the
only ones that have miscarried,
I would look as if there was
somebody somewhere, though
I may be a mere coincidence.

The amount of kinder's note
is \$95, dated 21 Apr. 1856, due
from date. The interest up
to say 21 Aug. 1862, 6 years &
4 months would be \$36.10 in
all \$131.10 - add \$5. for deposi-
tion (which I promised to my
clerk who did the writing) the
whole would be \$136. On
receipt of check I will send
you the note, -
